
I look forward to hearing from and seeing all of you. I missed the UBI Banquet this year for that reason. I hope to make up for that this spring and summer at events in our area.

# **Director's Report - Nancy Norris**



# **Director's Report - Jered Shofner**

I could picture Fred Bear, Glenn St. Charles, or Howard Hill sipping a cup of coffee in this clubhouse. That was the thought in my mind as I looked around the Blackhawk Field Archers traditional shoot in August of 2020. Everything about the grounds and the clubhouse channeled a simpler time when the icons of our sport were living men and traditional archery was just archery.



My first visit to the Blackhawk Field Archers near Rockton, Illinois was prompted by stories from Bob and Jan Mayo. With the pandemic of 2020 forcing the cancellation of most events, the trip was a welcome change of scenery and a chance to enjoy some social distancing with friends. I quickly found out that this was not your typical 3D shoot.

My first clue was the door to the clubhouse. The door handle is a hand-made iron piece in the shape of an arrowhead. To enter the large clubhouse, is to be surrounded by archery history. If the UBI were to design their own clubhouse, this would be it! There are a few special mounts, several historical archery photos, and bows hanging on the wall. My favorite feature of the building was the large stone fireplace. The membership of the club was asked to collect a stone or two from their favorite hunting grounds. Those stones were assembled to form the hearth.

The ancient handmade paper mache 3D targets are worth the trip alone. This club pre-dates foam 3D targets. The members crafted these amazing full-size 3D targets decades ago. The club has worked hard to preserve this history. My visit to Blackhawk field






archers coincided with occasional rain, so the precious targets were covered with plastic tarps when archers were not shooting. Like a home-built bow or hand split feathers, these targets add something special to the archery experience.

In addition to the 3D course, the grounds include a large open range and camping area. The clubhouse kitchen provided great food during the weekend. I have included several photos to give you a better idea of what this great shoot has to offer.

### **IFOR Report - Rick Stillman**

The Illinois Legislature is already hard at work with almost 7000 bills introduced between the House and Senate. Listed below are some of the bills most relevant to UBI members. Be assured, there are more to come. You can find all of them listed online at: https://www.ilga.gov/legislation/. The Capitol Outdoors web page: https://www.capitol-outdoors.com/ maintains a good list of outdoor relative legislation and their facebook page is a great place to keep up on what is happening.

There are several bills introduced to "fix" the trailer license fee screw up from last year. So far, HB1898 is my favorite as it provides for a \$100 refund to those who bit the bullet and paid the \$118 fee. Other trailer fee bills are HB2916, 2917, 0036, 0636, 0837 and 2895

One item of particular interest and importance to the UBI and its members is HB3754! Sponsored by Charles Meier (R 108th District, Highland), this bill would include the AIRBOW in the archery season. If you feel the crossbow is out of place in the archery only season, just take a look at this thing! It is a compressed air gun that is designed to shoot crossbow bolts. There are currently three manufacturers and they all want a piece of the archery season action. It's not my place to tell you all how to think, but I'm confident that the UBI will choose to oppose this legislation and I believe the IFOR Board will agree. This bill has been assigned to the Agriculture and Conservation Committee. Please follow our website and facebook page for updates.



### Region 2 Report - Dan Forystek

First of all, if this reaches anyone in time The Joliet Archery club will have a shoot on May !st & 2nd . It's a beautiful time of the year in a really nice setting. Same great place as the region 2 summer shoot coming in August. It will be good to get out without a mask on.

Our area is really going through some changes in a good way in the north east part of the state. We are seeing more deer but I have to wonder if it has anything to do with learning what not to do with trail cams. I am sure that implementing food plots help the deer make it through the winter and into the spring well fed encourages them to hang around.

In spite of a very healthy population of Raccoons and a lot of opossums, and now many Bobcats the turkeys seem to be going through a population explosion. What once was a sighting of a Turkey a rarity now people are seeing 50 in a group in a plowed field. WE had 9 hens in our front yard and 9 hens in the back at the same time. The future looks bright.

I hope all of you got the turkey permit you needed, and good luck in the woods. And PLEASE get pictures of your success over to Michael to share with all of us.

Is anyone looking for a sharper broad head?

I think it would be easier to list the people who are not concerned with trying to get a sharper arrow head. In fact, I personally can't think of anyone who is not looking for a sharper head. Most of my life I have considered a sharp pocket knife, or for that matter any knife, important. Weather it was gutting or butchering deer or filleting a fish. Even more important I think is an arrow head as sharp as a hunter can get it.





I personally own a box full of what was, at its time, the newest, latest, greatest, sharpening gizmo a person could its hands on. Only to find out that a file and strop worked better.

After finally getting a two blade double bevel head to acceptable sharpness the single bevel hit the market. Although I could get it sharp enough to kill, I was never really happy with it. Then Jim Ellis gave me a call said he had a system to overcome the biggest major issue incurred while attempting to create a sharp edge, the angle. After knowing Jim for a good while I had no doubt his system would work, however I had no idea how quick and simple it would work. After trying his new jig on a single bevel Grizzly head that took me forever to get close to acceptable sharpness, I was shocked to see how after only a couple strokes it was hardly believable how incredibly sharp and polished it was. After several sharpness tests on everything I could get my hands on in the little arrow making shop I became concerned that it could not be left just anywhere because no one but myself would realize the real danger involved in coming in contact with the edge of this point. It wasn't only the sharpness that concerned me but the flawless smoothness of the entire bevel that would ease it into a very deep cut before you would feel it.

All other previous sharpening methods left me feeling somewhat safe that I would at least feel a slight rough edge on it before I was cut to the bone. I set the point down on the table looking at the harmless looking chrome like edge and felt like I was leaving a loaded gun out for an unsuspecting child to pick up. I have heard of the term scary sharp many times before and used hundreds of scalpels in taxidermy work, but this is dangerously SHARP.

Jim has now perfected this tool to be used on two blade points also. If you like to get one of these sharpening jigs contact Jim Ellis, if you dare. But don't say I didn't warn you.

### Region 5 Report - Randall Beasley

Possibly two of the lesser-known archery hall of fame inductees are Walt and Ken Wilhelm. While I knew about Howard Hill, Fred Bear, and Ben Pearson in my early twenties, I only discovered the Wilhelm brothers in my late fifties. Although the Wilhelm brothers were contemporaries of Howard Hill and Fred Bear, information about the exploits of the two brothers is slight in comparison. Walt wrote a book called The Last Rig to Battle Mountain describing the family's trip from Missouri to California in a covered wagon while his father prospected for gold. This trip started in Missouri in 1896 and finished in California in 1910. On more than one occasion Walt describes how his father had to use his Winchester lever action to thwart horse thieves and claim jumpers. At the beginning of the trip, Walt was three years old, a sister was one, and other siblings, including Ken, were born during the trip. The children shot bows and arrows and played with Native Americans who lived close to them during the travels. Ken's obituary states he learned to shoot on a Blackfoot reservation in Idaho.

Walt wrote many articles for a variety of magazines. Sometimes these were hunting stories, other times, the stories featured their desert crawling trucks "Lena" and "Prowler." A September 1940's Popular Mechanix article featured Walt and Ken and their truck Lena. The article called Cowboys on Wheels explained how they installed two sets of tires on each wheel (one inside of the other) to avoid flats while out in the Mojave Desert. The trucks featured a kill switch on the back, so the brothers could ski behind the truck and shoot an arrow into the switch stopping the truck. A short video is available on YouTube showing Lena, and the brothers closing their gas station for the day to play in the Mojave Desert.

Since Hill and the Wilhelm's lived in California, they sometimes hunted together. One example is an August 1936 pig hunt described by Walt in the Ye Slyvan Archer. In this article, Walt mentions Ken always had two to three hundred arrows ready for any hunt and had no trouble getting two dozen ready for a hunt. Walt also mentioned that he used an eighty-four-pound bow, Ken a one hundred-three-pound bow, and Howard a one hundred-eight-pound bow.

In a book about Howard Hill, the author mentioned a turkey shoot tournament where Howard won the turkey, but only after Howard and Walt had shot the course several times. The first few times the two were tied. On the last round, Howard won by just a point or two. This was the level of Walt's skills.

I highly recommend the YouTube shorts of Walt's shooting. Walt has an unusual draw and anchor. He draws his right hand close to his side just above the hip bone. He does not anchor against the hip bone but has a floating anchor. I attempted to draw my 30-pound recurve using this type of draw and found I would not be able to pull more than that without extensive training. How anyone could draw an eighty-four-pound bow using Walt's method is beyond my concept.

Ken also possessed superior archery skills. He once held the archery distance flight record of 896 yards and was possibly the first person to shoot an arrow more than one-half mile.

Ken and Walt made movie shorts in the 1930's and 1940's which were as daring and entertaining as anything I have seen on YouTube. One of the short movies shows Walt sitting on a crate with an apple on his head while Ken is behind him with his bow and arrow. Ken shoots the following items from Walt's head: an apple, a ping pong ball, a die, and last a collar button. The shots were from 30 feet away. While he did not miss, I consider such shots too dangerous for anyone to ever attempt. Yet, the brothers performed this trick shot time after time without anyone getting hurt. In another short movie, Ken holds a match, and Walt lights it with the sandpaper glued around the arrow shaft. These shots allow for no mistakes ever!

One additional tidbit about Ken could be fact or an exaggeration. In his book, Walt described Ken ability to throw rocks, which he did frequently. Accordingly, one story claimed Ken was able to throw a baseball well enough to be a major league pitcher. However, he chose a different profession because he wanted to close to his family. Furthermore, the author claims in 1929 Ken threw 15 pitches to Babe Ruth and struck him out three times. If this is true, it might be part of his natural ability which helped him shoot bows so accurately.

Currently, I found three YouTube shorts about these brothers. I only wish the other movies made for Paramount Pictures would become available.


## **Region 3 Report - Ron Hayford**

#### **UBI Crossbow Position Statement**

The United Bowhunters of Illinois is adamantly opposed to the inclusion of any weapon that is not hand drawn and hand held in Illinois' archery season. Specifically, we are opposed to the use of the crossbow and the drawlock device, as well as any other weapon that does not require the shooter to draw by hand, hold by hand, and release by hand. Such weapons have the potential to negatively alter the primitive weapon status originally designated for archery seasons in Illinois

We are not opposed to the use of such devices by the truly handicapped, but we do question the legitimacy of some of these cases. Therefore we support all efforts by the IDNR to maintain the integrity in issuing handicap permits so as to minimize abuse in this practice

#### **UBI Archery Season Position Statement**

The United Bowhunters of Illinois is opposed to the creation of any new hunting season, or the extension of any existing hunting season which will decrease the length of the archery only season or displace the season into less favorable dates. While the United Bowhunters of Illinois recognizes the rights of hunters who choose to use other weapons in separate hunting seasons, we will oppose all efforts to include such users in Illinois' archery season

#### **UBI Big Game Shooting Enclosure Position Statement**

The United Bowhunters of Illinois opposes any big game hunting where the animal is within the confines of game proof enclosures. We oppose this despicable practice on the grounds of fair chase hunting, the threat of disease spreading from captive cervids to our wild deer populations, and the fact that privatizing wildlife is contrary to the North American model of game management. It is our position that the selling of hunts for big game animals that have been raised within an enclosure, or animals that currently are confined within an enclosure should be illegal in Illinois
